

Saturday evening, September 17, 1966, the students of Platte Valley Academy gathered in the gym to divide up into groups to go to various faculty homes for their entertainment. Each group had a leader who supervised them from home to home. Games were played at each home and then popcorn and apples were served at the last home to which each group went.

At Wesslen's house the games were "dropping the clothes pins into the milk bottle" and drawing or acting out songs or sayings. Greenman's had a cork game. Corks for eight players were in a circle, with 10 for each player in a small dish. Dice were thrown and on a seven or eleven the corks were pulled out before the person who threw the dice caught the corks with a funnel. If the corks were caught, the owner of the cork had to forfeit a bean to the person with the funnel.

"Pit" was played at Mrs. Hill's house. The Maizes paired us off with a number game. In the girls' dorm we played telegraph. Also a word relay game was played.

At Melvin Anderson's house we had a spelling bee where we spelled the words backwards, cut paper holding the scissors with our left hands, and drew pictures in the dark. The player piano also provided entertainment there.


I'm also sure that this person, who is the writer, felt real guilty and will never make another easily-caught get away!


